JERRE TODD • ELE RESIDENT AND FRIEND TO MANY

ELE lost another very important and long time neighbor on Friday, Nov. 15, 2019 -**Jerre R. Todd**– . Jerre was born Jan. 16, 1932, in Fort Worth, Texas and was married to wife, Melba for 59 years.

Jerre was a graduate of Paschal High School and his beloved TCU (Journalism, 1957). He was a member of the famous "murderer's row" sports writing staff at the Fort Worth Press, alongside his dear, lifetime friends, Dan Jenkins, Blackie Sherrod, Bud Shrake and Gary Cartwright. He was also a proud U.S. Army veteran.

He and Melba made Arlington their home in Arlington in 1959, and he remained a champion in the Arlington and Fort Worth communities his entire adult life. Jerre never met a stranger. His charisma and wit were his trademark calling cards. His Super parties were legendary. In 1965, he founded his advertising and public relations agency, *Jerre R. Todd & Associates.* Jerre and his agency embodied the spirit of true advertising "Madmen" culture well before the TV lore.



"Chiefie" loved his work, and he built his agency into one of the best in Fort Worth. He was a masterful presenter and persuader. For 40 years, as the tournament's public relations leader, he played a major role in helping the Colonial golf tournament to become known around the world. He also led the National Cutting Horse Association to introduce the sport internationally. Among others he represented included the Cotton Bowl, Six Flags, TCU Frog Club, Continental National Bank, the Fort Worth Convention and Visitors Bureau, Miss Texas Pageant, Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and he was the Ringling Brothers & Barnum Bailey Circus' go-to publicist in DFW for years. Jerre was awarded the Fort Worth Ad Club Silver Medal Award, and he held the distinction of being Accredited in Public Relations (APR) by the Public Relations Society of America.

So many neighbors remember Jerre walking his huge sheep dogs. He loved them so much. He loved his church and his faith, TCU and TCU athletics, tailgating, the Ad-PR business, the Colonial tournament, hunting, fishing and the great outdoors, golf, musicals, card games, the Big Dance basketball shenanigans, horse racing, dogs and so much more.

ELE ANNUAL BUDGET FOR 2020

The annual ELE budget for Calendar Year 2020 was set at \$169,000 by the Board of Directors at a recent meeting. We thought it might be informative to all ELE Homeowners to know how our dues are being used.

There are 332 homes within the ELE HOA, with each homeowner assessed a \$450 annual fee (\$149,400). These funds provide for approximately 90% of the operating budget which cover services provided to all ELE homeowners. The remaining funds come from sources such as oil & gas royalties and facility rental.

These funds are divided amongst the following categories:

-Administrative expenses: \$29,600 for accounting/audit and taxes, insurance, directory and newsletter.

-Pool and club house: \$77,700

-Common Ground: \$32,000

-Social events and tennis: \$3,000

That leaves \$26,700 remaining of operating income. Any uncommitted operating income is set aside in a reserve account and is used for unbudgeted initiatives such as: 1) club house upgrade/repairs, i.e. A/C system; 2) common grounds upgrades/repairs; and, 3)swimming pool upgrades/repairs. This year, the cost of the remaining repairs to the canal after the 2018/19 flood damage will have to come from this year's operating income. The work on the dock is underway, but only repairs - not anything more.

We hope this helps to let you know how your dues are being spent. If you have any questions, please contact one of our board members and they will be happy to answer questions or find the answers. And, of course, copies of the annual budget are passed out at the homeowners' meeting in September, or you can request a copy from any board member.

EGRETS

In this case, no news is good news. So far, only one egret sighting has been reported. That's thanks to the diligent trimming and thinning of tree branches where the birds want to nest.
