Duncan Fry is graduating from Martin H.S. and will attend Southwestern in the Fall.





ELE POOL—2020

The pool this summer will be operating under changing rules. With the COVID-19 regulations, we will begin the summer opening the pool on schedule, Saturday of Memorial Weekend, but without the party as usual. It will open full time on Saturday May 30 for the rest of the summer, it is hoped. At first there will be only 15 people allowed in the water at one time, and everyone else will have to remain safely distanced outside of the water. No parties will be held for awhile, and no guests allowed until restrictions are lifted. The bathrooms will be cleaned, but we do ask everyone to do their part, and wipe down surfaces with cleaners provided after each use.

<u>Listen to the Lifeguards</u>, and let's all play nice. As they say, we are all in this together.

GROUNDS NEWS:

As many have noticed lately, there have been problems operating the gate into the boat dock area. It is believed that someone rammed the gate open rather than using the gate code to automatically open it. The parts for repair have been ordered and the actual repair work should begin shortly. However, alternatives to the swing arm are being studied in case this happens again.

There have been numerous cases of trespassing onto that property recently, as well as trespassing onto the tennis courts and the canal area. Most are fishermen looking for that special hole. But be-

sides liability, trash is left which is left for the grounds person to pick up and dispose of properly.

Arlington Police have been called a number of times. Sgt. Romero has put extra patrols on the area. But, he asks that if anyone suspects someone of trespassing on ELE property to please contact 911 immediately. He urges to NOT approach them, but make notes of information to give to the police.

Secondly, a replacement for the broken section of the <u>dock ramp</u> is being fabricated. It is currently overdue, so it is anticipated that it should be installed shortly also. But, once again, this is a stop gap measure, as the entire dock and ramp need to be put into better shape.

The <u>canal work</u> done last summer did a perfect job in containing the rushing waters after the most recent heavy rains. The remaining work will continue as soon as lake levels decline this summer.

Irrigation and lighting need to be repaired and/or replaced at all three entrances. New summer plants have been added so watering is necessary. Those are also on the wish list.
